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A fellow researcher on mainland churches once published *The Nine Developmental Trends of Chinese Churches*, pointing out that some house churches have come to light, that the church is still a minority group, that urbanization has profoundly affected church development, with the emergence of diversification in pastoring modes, congregationalist church governance and full time pastoral ministry. Churches go for comprehensive evangelistic social ministries, global outlook, post-denominationalism, and there will be a golden age in theological education. Here I wish to share some of my observations from my connections with mainland pastors. At the moment, turns in pastoring modes on the Mainland are roughly as follows:

From evangelistic growth to emphasis on pastoring

Before, the mainland churches put evangelism on top of all things and enjoyed a rapid growth, even to the point of "births without upbringing". But now the churches have entered the pastoring stage, with issues of marriage and family, parenting, guarding against cults as well as issues on ethics. Pastors find it inadequate just preaching the gospel of the cross, healing or driving out demons. On their conversion, believers have to face all kinds of questions about life and faith, and need teachers to guide them on their way.

From Bible study to trials in life

Mainland churches stressed more on prayer meetings and home visits in the past, but when urbanization becomes a trend, migrant workers in the city find their children's education a burden that needs proper address. The pastoring mode will have to embrace generational ministry-couples, women and adolescents become valued by the church. The economic boom resulting from urbanization also turns people materialistic. The education level of the congregation has been raised, more intellectuals joining the church. Pastoring the new generation requires some more thoughts and plans to engage them in church events. As the pulpit faces drastic changes, teaching the Bible truths about marriage, parenting and possessions are

From Salvation to social services

The 2008 Wenchuan earthquake in Sichuan was a divide, when churches and believers got more driven to involve themselves in rescue work and the church began to show more concern towards human needs. Loving families of believers took abandoned orphans into their homes. Some churches saw the needs of the disabled and joined in to take care of them. All these actions influenced the pastoring approach of the church which is to practice holistic care.

From Bible understanding to theology

Mainland believers now get more opportunities for training than before. Pastors and ministers accessing theology books published overseas and consulting more translated versions have broadened their minds. And as problems believers face are becoming more complex, they hold higher and more professional expectations of their pastors. Some have also sparked off discussions within churches on thoughts and rationales of various denominations.

From one-way to multi-dimensional

Pastoring in the past was simply sermon-giving. Future pastoring, because of the changes mentioned above, will necessitate the exploration of diversified means on various spectrums apart from the Sunday sermon – teaching (reinforcement of the Sunday School), counseling (believers' life and family issues) and leading (team coordination and delegation). That definitely suggests multi-dimensional ministries.

From Simon Says to boards of professionals

The churches in the old times normally employed the one-church-one-pastor mode, but now city churches look for expert team-mates who can fit in with their development agenda. Some churches even have a dozen ministers on their team to venture out on different ministries. This is how the city churches are going, the direction meaning generational and group ministries.
