QR Code Fraud

Recently, over ten restaurants in Beijing fell victim to "ordering scams." After showing their payment QR codes to "customers," the restaurants found their accounts drained rather than paid. Scammers call claiming to book a table, then discuss payment via WeChat. They claim the shop's code isn't working and ask for another. During a video call, they instruct staff to point the phone at another device's payment code. Exploiting a loophole in WeChat and Alipay—where the "payment code" (for outgoing funds) is the default screen—the scammers take a quick screenshot to steal funds the moment the merchant switches screens.

Dear Warriors in Christ,

Recently, an app in China called "Dead Yet?" (a.k.a. Demumu) has exploded in popularity. It requires users to log in once a day to "report safety." If a user fails to log in for several consecutive days, the system automatically sends an alert to their pre-registered emergency contacts. Developed by three Gen Z programmers and released for free last summer, downloads have soared in just six months.

Why has "Dead Yet?" gone viral? It seems to strike a chord with a deep-seated need in many modern hearts: the need to be seen, respected, and protected. There are at least 200 million people living alone in China, and research indicates that over one-third of them socialize less than once a week on average. These solitary individuals need care and companionship, and this app relieves them of the anxiety of dying alone.

This brings to mind the motto of Radio Liangyou: "Heart-to-heart, Hand-in-hand." Our hope is to walk alongside our listeners, becoming companions on their journey of faith.

Miracle Drug

Recently, “Ginseng, Bitter Melon, Buckwheat, Mulberry Leaf Extract” has been a hot seller across major platforms, touted as a so-called “miracle drug for lowering blood sugar.” Many elderly patients, trusting the advertising, bought it only to find that it not only failed to control their blood sugar but delayed medical treatment. Reporters found that the product’s category was labeled as a sports nutrition food, and the top three ingredients listed were edible glucose, maltodextrin, and corn starch. The “miracle drug” is merely a hook: the seller arranges so-called “experts” to instruct customers on how to take it and then conducts one-on-one selling / marketing, and they promote more expensive customized treatment packages, claiming they can “cure diabetes.”

Drink and Drive

Spring Festival is often the peak period for drink-driving violations. Some drivers believe that if they drank at noon, it is safe to drive at night; or that if they drank the day before, it is safe to drive the next morning—yet they are still found to be driving under alcoholic influence. The police explain that the rate at which alcohol is metabolized varies from person to person and is affected by factors such as the amount consumed, the alcohol content, and individual physique. And, it is common that “the person is awake but the alcohol hasn’t worn off”. Many may think that e-bikes are slower and less dangerous. Losing physical control of the body, slower reactions, and impaired judgment—these dangers caused by alcohol do not discriminate by vehicle type; they are all drink-driving.

Validation of the Strongest

On January 2, five people illegally crossed the “Aotai Trail”. One person made it down the mountain on their own, one was rescued, and three died. The Trail, traverses between Mount Ao in the Qinling Mountains and Mount Taibai, is known as one of China’s deadliest hiking trails. It features high altitude, long distances, difficulty to resupply, rapidly changing weather, and with many blind spots for communication. Some influencers promote completing the route as a “graduation ceremony for the strongest,” distorting its high death rate into a “proof of the strongest,” misleading many online users into blindly pursuing the thrill of conquering nature. People go based solely on passion, leading to an endless stream of accidents on the “Aotai Trail”.

Livestreaming Industry

With increasingly diverse employment options today, the online livestreaming industry has attracted more than 38 million streamers. However, the contractual relationship between streamers and streaming platforms is often ambiguous. Many streamers sign an “influencer agency contract” rather than an employment contract. As of December 2024, the number of online livestreaming users reached 833 million, and the number of professional streamers grew by 1.5 times year on year. How to balance an employer’s competitive interests with streamers’ right to work has become a point of debate. Courts have suggested that liquidated damages for breaching non-compete agreements should be reasonable.
